Blood Runners

Malcolm Parkinson.

Malcolm Parkinson has been a Blood Runner volunteer since 2016 and has a enjoyed a life-long affinity with motorcycles since his boyhood when his father introduced him to the machines while working as an AA patrol man.

The former Conservative Minister Norman Tebbit once achieved some notoriety by telling unemployed workers to do what his father and others before them did when searching for work: "Get on your bike." A motley crew of dedicated volunteers in Cambridge and Suffolk did just that and have since become a key asset in helping the NHS to continue its work.

According to the Cambridge English Dictionary the definition of a volunteer is "a person who does something for other people or for an organisation, willingly and without being forced or paid to do it". By that yardstick the team members who help to deliver a vital blood provision service to the NHS go above and beyond that frame of words every day of the week and every month of the year 24 hours a day.

The nature of their work is blood running and in Cambridge and Suffolk 120 volunteers and 12 controllers ensure that vital blood supplies are delivered on demand to the major hospitals in the two eastern counties: six in all, these being Cambridge, Papworth, Peterborough, Hinchingbrooke, West Suffolk Hospital and Ipswich. They come from all walks of life, all shapes and sizes and from all age groups and, working from home, they are on call 24/7, ready at a moment's notice to undertake round trips of up to 100 miles in all kinds of weather to make sure emergency blood supplies are collected and delivered to a particular hospital on demand.

One of these riders is Malcolm Parkinson, who lives in Cockfield near Bury St Edmund's, who outlined the history of the Blood Runners during a fascinating and humorous talk to members of the Cambridge branch.

He and his fellow motor bike riders are part of an enthusiastic group of individuals known by the collective name of SERVSC - Service by Emergency Response Volunteers for the Suffolk and Cambridgeshire counties. The SERV volunteers operate nationally and in addition to delivering much needed blood supplies the riders also undertake to deliver other products such as platelets, samples, donated human milk, prescription medicines, x-rays, faecal matter, neural scans (dvds), surgical tools and even patient notes. The first service was established in Surrey in 1981, but motorcycle enthusiasts have been transporting blood since the 1960s.

All of this is done without payment and since they were formed locally in 2010 the group has saved the NHS more than £1million in Cambridge and Suffolk alone by reducing the need to use other expensive forms of transport such as private hire taxis.

Malcolm said: "We transport anything that is patient related and provided it is urgent enough that a hospital would be prepared to pay for a taxi or dedicated courier."

The riders show incredible commitment and willingness to take to the road whatever the conditions. "It's what we do," said Malcolm. "It is our way of putting something back into the community and all of the volunteers believe the job they do really does make a difference."

SERVSC provides four liveried motorcycles and a distinctive uniform, but mostly the transport is undertaken by privately-owned bikes and in some cases, privately-owned cars. Since their first successful transfer in 2011 the local group have made 12,000 deliveries consisting of more than 45,000 boxes.

Nationally the Blood Runners in 2017 completed 93,000 deliveries. The service costs an estimated £40,000 to run each year and each call out saves the NHS between £75 and £100, so the saving nationally is considerable, but so too is the personal financial input of the volunteers who pay for their own fuel while on SERV duty.

No wonder then their success has received widespread recognition and heaps of praise, so much so that word of their devoted volunteer work even reached Royal ears and in 2019 the Queen awarded them the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, a badge of honour now proudly worn on the sleeves of their bright yellow high-viz jackets.

On joining, the riders commit to doing two 12-hour shifts a month, each shift being 7am to 7pm or 7pm to 7am, but many of them willingly do far more hours than that. The volunteer riders are given a half day in the classroom when they receive training on product handling in addition to route familiarisation, a very important safety regulation as each rider sticks to the same route on all occasions so that controllers know which road they are using in the event of delay or accident.

The blood runners work closely with other sections of the medical world including support for the air ambulance teams of Magpas (Mid-Anglia General Practitioner Accident Service) and the East Anglia Air Ambulance in addition to undertaking deliveries for the National Blood Service who generally do not work in the evenings, bank holidays or weekends.

In August 2012 the Blood Runners branched out and became Milk Runners too when they created a service to ensure delivery of frozen bottles of donated human breast milk used to support premature babies in Neonatal Intensive Care. The speed of their motorcycles played a major role in delivering the milk quickly and in a nod to Benny Hill's popular TV song about Ernie the Fastest Milkman in the West they became known in the medical community as "the fastest milkmen in the East"! The riders liaise with volunteers from other county groups, of which there are 30 in the UK, and meet at pre-arranged destinations to continue the long-range transportation of whatever product is required.

One of the most notable distances involving the Suffolk and Cambridge team saw them take part in a relay to Bristol to deliver much needed milk to a baby patient; a journey which took three and a half hours, a travelling time considerably less than under normal motoring conditions, but this mission of mercy was undertaken at night and enjoyed the benefit of a blues and twos police escort for the last leg from Basingstoke in Wiltshire, courtesy of a police officer being the brother of one of the SERV riders and permission to do so being granted by the Chief Constable!

SERV receives no money from the Government, NHS or regulatory body and relies on donations from members of the public, corporate sponsorship and charitable organisations plus their own fund-raising activities to raise money to keep the service running.


