

Inside UK Parliament free guided tours

UK residents can request a free 'Inside UK Parliament' guided tour by contacting their Member of Parliament (MP) or a member of the House of Lords.

What does the tour cover?

During this 75-minute tour, your guide will:

- explain the work of UK Parliament and its relevance today
- outline how the working spaces you visit on the tour are used
- set out ways you can get involved and engage with the democratic process
- highlight some of the dramatic history of the Palace of Westminster

These free guided tours are not available on Thursdays, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays.

UK residents can book a free guided tour up to six months in advance by contacting their local MP or a Member of the House of Lords. Early booking is recommended. You do not have to know your MP personally or support them politically to book this tour.



Whilst the NHS Retirement Fellowship runs a national book club, this group of people, connected through their work for the NHS, wanted to create a group with a more personal touch. Just over a year ago they started meeting once a month to choose and discuss books. Now they have six members and were chosen to read *The Marriage Portrait* by Maggie O'Farrell.

The group's discussion focussed on the feminist voice and how sociocultural factors can determine your life. The group found the commoditisation of women in the novel and the loss of childhood a sad, but honest, theme yet, they agreed that the character of Lucrezia was strong and resourceful and someone that the entire group wanted to succeed, even if they knew it was unlikely to end in her favour.

One member said, "We all felt the book was beautifully written with very detailed descriptive prose and imagery, denoting a keen observation of the human condition. Overall there was a sadness in the novel because Lucrezia was brought into this world to be sold on."

Another wrote, "The characters were all very well structured and totally believable so we were drawn into their lives. While reading I wish it didn't have to end because we knew Lucrezia's fate. It showed how a child, who from the beginning seemed unwanted and unloved, was catapulted into adulthood before she was ready. You cannot help but weep for the loss of her childhood."

writes about her role as Speaker Secretary

I am a founder member of Suffolk West NHSRF, and I have been a member of the committee since the start. My role at present is to find and book speakers for this group. We have a large group of members, around 120. Usually between 70 to 80 attend the monthly meetings.

Our group has at least two months a year when we do not have speakers and then we have a Christmas lunch, and during the year at AGM time, we have a social and fundraising day for our fellowship, with books, cakes, and items that are made by the craft group.

We hear talks on any subject that we feel would be interesting, anything from animals to historical subjects, people come to talk about an unusual experience or something they feel passionate about. One lady talked about her work for people with 'Vision impairment in Bangladesh'. We also have subjects that will help our members such as how to protect ourselves as much as possible. We had one speaker who with a doctor friend came to talk about 'Atrial Fibrillation and Stroke' and they tested everyone to see if we needed to see our own GPs.

The subjects we have had have included local history, and some of London's history, and 'Cases that made Criminal History'. Once we had a stonemason who had worked on the Bury St Edmunds extended tower of our Cathedral. We have had 'An Eccentric look at Suffolk' which was presented by a well know radio speaker and was about Dialects. We have had speakers from 'East Anglian Air Ambulance' service they need our help to continue with their work, and a local speaker about 'Medical detection Dogs' a speaker from 'Riding for the disabled.' We had a speaker talking about 'How to protect Hedgehogs' and what to feed them.

Earlier this year we had 'County life in the time of Gainsborough, Constable and Austin.' Also, this year we had a very interesting talk from the local 'Postcard Club' here in Bury St Edmunds, with fine examples of the cards that are collected, many of them old and very interesting.

Many of our speakers are fund raisers for other Charities, the man who talked to us about 'Country Life' was collecting for our local 'Upbeat' which is a heart charity locally.

One speaker talked about 'Portraits = Henry VIII to David Beckham' and what the artist was trying to tell us, this talk was for a donation for Prostate Cancer UK.

Some of our speakers are supplementing their income and we are aware that it can take hours of hard work for them to produce an interesting talk. We are very grateful to them.


Capel Manor Gardens Summer Celebration 16th July 2023

- 1956 Polio immunisation programme begins.
- 1958 The first successful cardiopulmonary by-pass programme in the UK began at the Hammersmith Hospital, London
- 1960 The first kidney transplant takes place at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary, involving identical twins.
- 1960 First implantable heart pacemaker is used.
- 1968 Measles vaccine is introduced.
- 1968 The first heart transplant is carried out by South African-born, surgeon Donald Ross at the National Heart Hospital in London.
